

FCC OKAYS USE OF FM STEREO

Broadcasting on Regular Basis Begins June 1

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Federal Communications Commission Wednesday authorized stereophonic broadcasting on a regular basis by FM radio stations effective June 1.

The commission, which said it hoped this "will add a new dimension to FM listening," said it will later consider an extension of stereophonic sound to standard radio and television outlets.

The new service involves simultaneous broadcasting over two separate microphones and reception on receivers equipped with two loudspeakers. This gives the listener the illusion that the music or other material he hears is "spread out" before him, as if he were actually present.

The FCC adopted technical standards for stereophonic broadcasting based on a combination of proposals advanced by Zenith Radio Corp. of Chicago and General Electric Co. of Schenectady, N. Y.

It had been considering more than a half dozen proposed systems.

The FM station desiring to offer the service will continue to broadcast its programs to that portion of the general public having ordinary receiving sets. However, the station will send a second "piggy-back" broadcast of the same material over a separate microphone and this will come out in stereophonic sound on receivers equipped to receive it.

NO ESTIMATES

The commission said those desiring to receive stereophonic programs must purchase FM stereophonic receivers. It noted that present FM sets which are mounted in a stereophonic record player combination may be used for reception through purchase of an adapter. The commission had no estimates on the costs of new sets or adapters.

FM stations will not require special permits from the commission to engage in stereophonic operation but must conform to the technical standards which are designed to protect the broadcast to the general public from interference.
