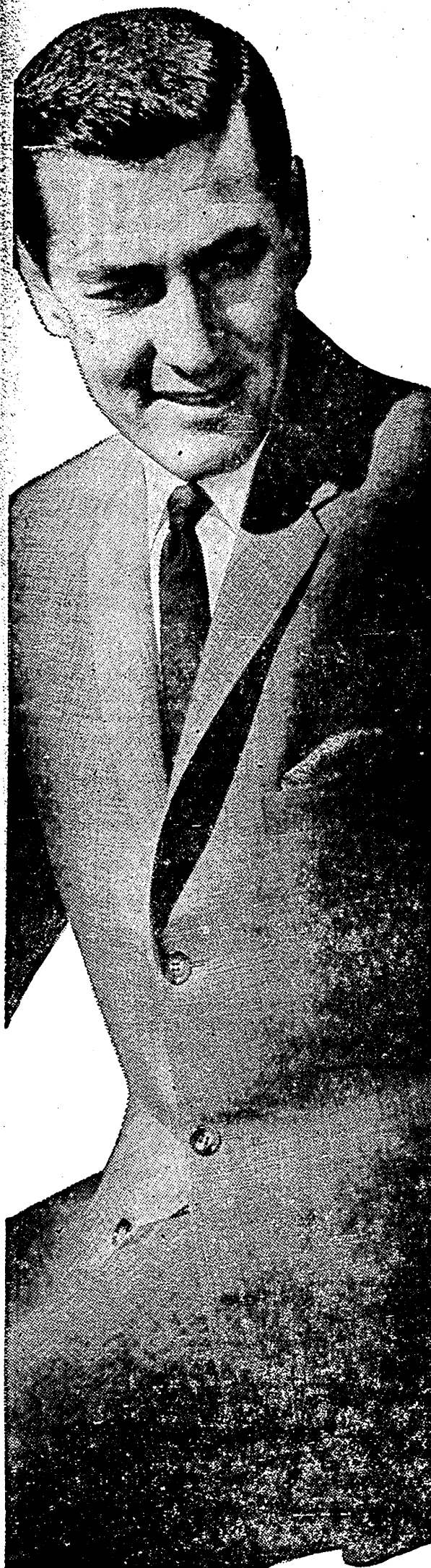

POLICE ARREST 27 BUS RIDERS

Pro-Mixing Groups Held at Jackson, Miss.

JACKSON, Miss.—Two sorties of "Freedom Riders" made a bloodless invasion of race-conscious Mississippi Wednesday. They wound up in city jail here for breaking the state segregation laws.

Both groups—one with 12 riders, including one white man, and the other with 15, also including one white—were promptly arrested by city police moments after they alighted from their buses and set foot in a white waiting room at the bus terminal.

No violence attended either arrival, and no attempts at violence were made along the 100-mile route the buses took after they entered the state.

BARNETT PLEADED

Gov. Ross Barnett said the non-violent invasion by freedom riders proved that "Mississippi is capable of handling its own affairs, as it always has been."

"I am happy that everything went off smoothly. I am grateful to all the people and officers for their splendid co-operation in seeing that no violence occurred or demonstrations erupted," the governor declared.

In a statement Tuesday night, Barnett called on the people to let state and local officers "handle any situation that may arise." He also wired Atty. Gen. Kennedy telling him the state needed no federal assistance.

Strategy for meeting freedom riders here was worked out Wednesday morning in a conference between Barnett and Mayor Allen C. Thompson, sources disclosed later.

The buses were whisked from the state line 16 miles east of Meridian over US Hwy. 80 by a state highway patrol car escort without making any intermediate stops.

ESCORT PROVIDED

A squad of National Guardsmen was put on each bus as it arrived from Alabama at the state line.

A cordon of Alabama state police cars accompanied the buses to the Mississippi border, where they were stopped and immediately surrounded by National Guardsmen with fixed bayonets.

State Adj. Gen. W. P. Wilson and state commissioner of public safety T. B. Birdsong met the first bus of freedom riders as it came into Mississippi at 11:40 a. m. Gen. Wilson went with a 15-car escort with the first bus to Jackson. Birdsong came in a convoy with the second bus, which arrived late Wednesday afternoon.

Both groups of riders, here to test state segregation laws, were arrested after police met them inside the bus terminal and ordered them to move along.

TWO COUNTS

When they refused, they were immediately booked on two counts—of refusing to move on when ordered by police and causing a breach of the peace.

A third charge—of attempting to incite a riot—was slapped on the first group of riders, but it was later withdrawn by city prosecutor J. A. Travis Jr.

"Freedom riders" were held in the city jail under \$500 bond for each of the two counts on which they were charged. Police said they refused to ask for release on bond and de-

clined to contact any local attorneys.

Their trials are expected to be held Friday in Municipal court, since that is the earliest date for the regular hearing of misdemeanor cases.

JAIL TERM POSSIBLE

They carry a maximum penalty of a \$500 fine and six months in jail.

Chief of Detectives M. B. Pierce said the only request he had from "freedom riders" following their arrest was to call headquarters of their sponsoring group, the Congress on Racial Equality in Nashville. Pierce said he attempted to call the CORE Nashville headquarters, but charges were refused at the other end.

Six Negro youths in the first bus headed into a white men's rest room when they arrived, while the others, including two Negro girls and white "freedom rider" Paul Deitrich, 29, Washington, D. C., were stopped in the waiting room by officers.

Capt. J. L. Ray, in charge of the police detail inside the station, twice ordered them to "move along." They made no reply but did not move.

While they were being arrested, officers arrested the other six Negroes inside the white men's rest room.

The second group filed directly from the bus into the waiting room and headed for the white restaurant in the bus terminal. Capt. Ray and several other officers blocked their way at the entrance to the restaurant and told them, "you're going to have to move along."

He then placed them under arrest. The white man included in this group was Peter Ackerman, New York, 22, a history major at Antioch college, Yellow Springs, Ohio.

'WORLD CITIZEN'

Negro riders in the first contingent to arrive included: Jean Thompson, 19, of New Orleans, unemployed; Julian Aaron, 20, of New Orleans, a student at Southern university; David J. Dennis, 20, of Shreveport, a student at Dillard university; Rev. A. M. Anderson, 33, of Nashville; Harold Andrews, 23, of Atlanta; Matthew Walker Jr., 19, of Nashville, a student at Fisk university; Bernard Lafayette, 20, of Tampa, a ministerial student at Fisk; Rev. James M. Lawson, 32, of Shelbyville, Tenn.; Joseph Carter, 19, of Brooklyn, N. Y., a student at Fisk; James Bevel, 24, of Nashville, a student; and Rev. C. T. Vivian, 36, of Nashville, Tenn.

Deitrich, who said he is an office worker in Washington, called himself a "citizen of the world" when interrogated by police. Officers called him the most arrogant of the 12 on the first bus.

City police surrounded the Trailways bus terminal well ahead of the arrival of buses and kept any potential mobs or groups from getting near the area. Police directed traffic for several blocks around to keep potential trouble makers away from the terminal.

The 14 Negroes in the second bus included Leroy Glenn Wright, 19, of Nashville; Clarence Thomas Jr., 20, of Champagne, Ill.; Henry J. Thomas, 19, of Elton, Fla.; Rev. Grady H. Donald, 21, of Nashville; Doris J. Castle, 18, of New Orleans; Jerome M. Smith, 22, of New Orleans; John H. Moody, 30, of Philadelphia; Rev. John Copeland, 44, of Nashville; Dion Tyrone Diamond, 19, of Petersburg, Va.; James L. Farmer, 41, of New York, national director of CORE; John Robert Lewis and Frank George Holloway, 22, of Atlanta; Ernest Patton Jr., 21, of Nashville; and Lucetia R. Collins, 21, of El Paso, Texas.

Threat of Bomb

Empties Station

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP)—A bomb threat emptied the Greyhound bus station here Wednesday shortly after a new group of "freedom riders" had arrived from Atlanta.

City police and National Guardsmen on duty outside the station to prevent violence on the arrival of the segregation-testing riders from Atlanta rushed into the terminal and began an immediate search.

A specially trained bomb squad from Maxwell Air Force Base on the outskirts of the city was sent to the station to help with the search.

Numerous other bomb scares have been received in Montgomery—mostly in schools—since the arrival of an earlier group of "freedom riding" whites and Negroes touched off racial rioting here last Saturday and Sunday. They were all false alarms.

The four white and three Negro riders on the bus Wednesday had already left the station in private cars when the telephone threat came. They drove away for an unannounced destination, accompanied by Negro leaders. National Guardsmen drove off with them as a protective measure.

STENNIS URGES 'INCITERS' BAN

Offers Bill to Bar Interstate Travel

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. John Stennis, (D-Miss.), introduced a bill Wednesday to make it a crime to travel in interstate commerce with intent to incite a riot.

Stennis acted as "freedom riders," who were the object of a riot in Montgomery, Ala., headed to Mississippi to test segregation in bus stations in that state.

In a statement, Stennis said his proposal—which appeared to have almost no chance of passage—was aimed at the "freedom riders" but also at others.

"As to the so-called freedom riders," Stennis said, "it is well known that this trip originated far from the South, and had as its announced purpose a trip through several states where local statutes would be violated—but even more grievously, the feelings and emotions would be aroused, and the habits and customs of the local people flouted."

"The fact that resentment was aroused is not unusual, but was to be expected—and in fact, this was the intent of the players and actors in this unhappy excursion. This journey was planned to make and arouse

trouble, and that is exactly what happened, as will always be the case in such instances.

"Such missions and incidents can serve no good purpose, while they are certain to create many bad and unwholesome situations. Instead of being encouraged by groups and cast into the political arena to be made a violation of the criminal statutes. Thus, the right of all would be protected and determined in a judicial manner."

Stennis said his bill would cover the Nazi "hate group," anti-Jewish bus riders now in Louisiana.
