

## 15 IN 'SIT-DOWN' PLEAD INNOCENT

\$100 Bond Set for Each of Accused

Attorneys for 15 members of the Congress on Racial Equality, arrested after staging a "sit-down" demonstration at police headquarters, entered pleas of not guilty Wednesday at arraignment in municipal court before Judge Paul P. Garofalo.

Judge Garofalo accepted the pleas and set a \$100 appearance bond on each of the accused, all Negroes.

He said he would subordinate his court to the criminal district court after police Capt. P. J. Trosclair, one of the arresting officers, told him that a case was being prepared for presentation to the New Orleans parish district attorney's office.

Judge Garofalo said the criminal district court was the appellate court for municipal court, and that under the circumstances, his court would subordinate to the state case.

### HIT AT ALLEGED BEATING

The 15 CORE demonstrators were arrested at 1:10 a. m. Wednesday at police headquarters where they had been staging a "sit-down" demonstration since 11:20 p. m. outside the office of police Supt. Joseph I. Giarrusso. Police said the group, totaling 19 at the outset, sat down on the floor and began singing religious hymns. Their leader, Jerome Smith, 22, 917 N. Tonti, said the demonstration was staged in protest to the alleged police beating of three white "freedom riders" last week at police headquarters. Giarrusso said no official complaint has been made about the alleged beating.

At about 12:30 a. m. they were questioned by Maj. Dominic Palmisano, supervisor of police districts, and Capt. Trosclair, head of the intelligence division.

The CORE members were warned that they would be arrested if they remained because their singing was interfering with operations of the communications center nearby. Four of them left, but the 15 others remained.

### BOOKED WITH VIOLATIONS

They were booked with three violations of a state statute, and with refusing to move on, a city ordinance. The state charges involve remaining in a place after being forbidden to remain, holding an unlawful assembly, and vagrancy by loitering in a public place.

The Russian road to long life, low blood pressure on Pacific Islands, and the shady substance that shades the skin are subjects for focus on health.

**Long Life**  
A Russian study of people ranging in age from 104 to 118 shows certain elements of their lives in common, says Dr. Irvine H. Page, Cleveland, Ohio, heart specialist.

Soviet researchers found these long-lived specimens had village backgrounds, good heredity, diets low in fat, and active physical exercise.

### DOES NOT WANT DESK--MORRISON

Wouldn't Accept It If Offered, He Says

Former Mayor deLesseps S. Morrison said Wednesday that he no longer wants the City Hall desk which he used for over 15 years as mayor. Previously Morrison had tried to obtain the desk from his successor, Mayor Victor H. Schiro. Having changed his mind on the matter, the ambassador to the Organization of American States asserted that he "wouldn't accept it if it were offered me."

In fact, the former mayor asserted that he did not even want a citizen's group to buy the desk from the city and present it to him.

"I don't need a desk and the only reason I ever considered or asked about it was because Mayor Schiro had offered to have the city council either donate or sell it to me for a nominal value," said Morrison.

"I certainly don't want any group to buy me a desk and I would not accept it if it were given to me."

Schiro had said that he would be willing to have the desk turned over to Morrison by sale or property exchange if it could be arranged. He also said that he would have no objection to a citizens' group purchasing the desk and presenting it to Morrison provided that it could be arranged legally.

### Bill on Pension Taxation Voted

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House passed a bill Wednesday designed to equalize tax advantages of retired persons without Social Security and those of old age insurance beneficiaries.

The bill was sent to the Senate by voice vote. It brings up to date a 1954 law establishing a tax credit for persons receiving private retirement income to balance off the tax-free treatment of Social Security and other federal government retirement payments.

Matching recent increases in Social Security benefits, the bill increases from \$1,200 to \$1,524 the maximum amount of income that can qualify as tax-free retirement income.

Other provisions make similar adjustments to match Social Security provisions on income which may be earned without entirely eliminating retirement benefits.

**Islands**  
A study of natives on Gau in the Fiji Islands and Abalang in the Gilberts showed that those Pacific islanders don't show the same soaring blood pressure rates beyond the age of 50 that Westerners have.

For one thing, researchers said, the islanders have not yet faced the stresses of Western culture in force.

**Shades**  
It's a brown pigment called melanin which is largely responsible for the color of your eyes, your hair and skin. Without it you would have to stay out of the sun entirely, or burn hopelessly and finally succumb to skin cancer.

Some two billion cells in the foundation layer of your skin secrete melanin. These cells may be responsible in large part for the varied hues of different races. But the difference in color from Caucasian, Asiatic, Indian or Negro is not due to more or fewer of the melanin secreting cells, a study shows.

The number of cells—weighing in total only some 1-30th of an ounce, is about the same for all races. It may be related instead to the fact that cells in some races contain more melanin than the same cells in other races.

**Smoke**  
In Winnipeg, Canada, at least, cigarette smoking starts early in life. A study of school children found a considerable number had

tried their first cigarette by the age of 6.

In elementary school, 40 per cent of the boys and 18 per cent of the girls had smoked their first cigarette.

More than 25 per cent of the boys in junior high school and 15 per cent of the girls smoked regularly. In high school, more than 44 per cent of the boys and 28 per cent of the girls were regular smokers.

**Fungus**  
A green fungus related to penicillin has produced an extract that stops the growth of other fungi. The fungus extract, isolated from the soil of California's San Joaquin Valley, is now being tested on animals.

**Help**  
The family doctor can probably handle about 90 per cent of the adolescents who get in trouble with the community and need help, says a Pennsylvania psychiatrist.

But doctors must know which cases they can help, and which they should refer to psychiatrists for more extensive treatment, says Dr. Blaine E. McLaughlin of Woman's Medical College.

Youths sometimes strike out against general authority in some symbolic way and up to a point society will accept this behavior. 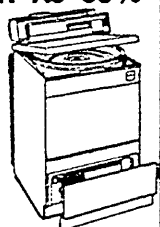

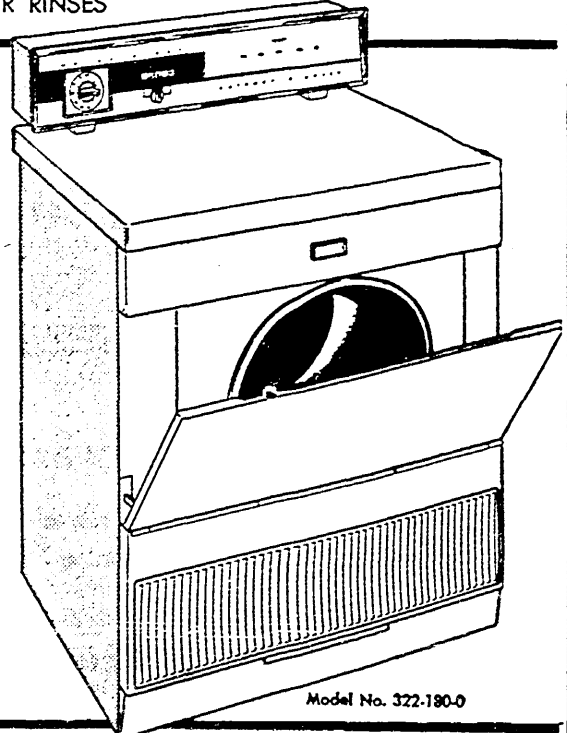
