Case of Caroline Carson,

On this 7" day of Hay , 1918, at Lake Providence county of Hast Carroll , State of La. before me,

J. B. Steed , a Special Examiner of the Bureau of Pensions, personally appeared Clora Atlass , who, being by me first duly sworn to answer truly all interrogatories propounded to her during this special examination of aforesaid claim for pension, deposes and says:

I am about 65 years of age; P.O. Lake Providence, La.

I am the wife of King Atlass and we farm.

Caroline has made her home with me and my husband most of the time since her husband died. Lewis Carson died in Lake Providence about the 25th day of April 1916, and I saw his corpse after his death. I attended the funeral services. I know that my aunt Caroline was not married after the death of her husband. My aunt. Caroline belonged to Ihrs. Eliza Bush before the Civil War and so did my mother. My mother was an own sister, they told me to my aunt Caroline Carson. I think mother was a Russell before she married my father who was an Evans, but father died when I was quite young. Mother has been dead for some years.

I have been told that my aunt Caroline had a husband before the war but I cannot remember much about him. I think his name was howis Campbell, and I used to hear mother and my aunt Caroline speak of Lewis Campbell and they said he died on the Bellmead plantation either before or just after the war broke out and I forget which. I know that he died there on the Bellmead place and it seems now that I saw them taking his body to the grave-yard there on the place. My aunt Caroline I know did not have any man after Lewis Campbell died until she married Lewis Carson. I think she married Carson right away after the close of the war and they were married on the Elton place over on the river and mother and I then lived on the Bellmead place. I did not see them married but heard of it at the time it took place. I am sure that they were married for there was considerable talk

8\$ at the time about their being married, and I am sure they were. 89 I have heard the old folks say they were married. Mother and I 30 used to visit them on the Elton place and they were then living together as man and wife and they said they had been 31 married by a man they called William Smith, and I used to know 32 him many years ago. He used to marry the colored folks in 33 that part of the country. No, I never knew of my aunt Caroline 34 being separated from her husband from the time they were said 35 to have been married till death took my uncle Lewis Carson. 36 My aunt Caroline has not been the same woman since she lost 37 her husband. She is almost blind and is perfectly helpless as 38 you know by looking at her. Myself and husband have to look 39 after her and give her her support. 40 I am not interested in the case more than I can help, and I 41 certainly would not make a wrong statement for her. I have 42 heard this statement read and it is correct as written. 43 her 44 CloraXAtlass.
